Furthermore, the paper discusses the representational challenges faced in visualizing pandemics and how comics navigate these through creative personifications and metaphorical depictions of viruses. The unique capacity of comics to engage, educate, and provoke thought

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makes them a powerful medium in the ongoing dialogue about pandemics. The comparison underscores how comics, with their blend of visual and textual elements, offer a distinct, complementary, and diegetic perspective to traditional pandemic literature, making complex and often abstract pandemic themes accessible and relatable to a wider audience.

DISSEMINATION OF SCIENTIFIC INFORMATION THROUGH COMICS


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widespread appeal crosses age barriers, making them an effective medium for educating diverse populations, including children who might find traditional methods of health communication less engaging.

By doing so, it transforms these public health guidelines into a narrative that is both entertaining and educational. In a particular segment of the comic, the villain Coronaman (aka COVID-19) sets out with the intention of invading a residence. However, he encounters an unforeseen impediment and is unable to gain entry into the house. This development is keenly observed by Nagraj, who discerns that Coronaman's failure to infiltrate the premises is due to the fact that the inhabitants inside are diligently adhering to self-quarantine measures.

The comic effectively demonstrates these practices in action, emphasizing their significance in combating the virus. Its visual portrayal of the virus as a tangible antagonist helps demystify the abstract nature of a pandemic, making the threat more relatable and understandable. Furthermore, the comic's distribution through accessible platforms (such as Kindle Store, Play Store, App Stores, and Social Media) ensures that its vital messages reach a broad audience, showcasing the power of comics as an innovative tool in pandemic-related public health communication. Through "Nagraj Strikes," readers not only engage with an exciting story but also absorb crucial health information, highlighting the comic's role as an impactful educational resource in times of health crises.

Designed to simplify and communicate the intricacies of COVID-19 to a younger audience, this comic uses the character Vaayu, a superhero, to educate children about the virus and its prevention methods. The narrative focuses on age-appropriate information, ensuring that the content is both understandable and engaging for children. By presenting preventive measures like hand washing and social distancing in a fun and relatable way, the comic has been instrumental in empowering children with knowledge and skills to protect themselves and others. This approach highlights the effectiveness of comics as a medium for disseminating critical health information to children, who are key influencers in their families and communities. Kids, Vaayu & Corona stands as a testament to the potential of comics in fostering pandemic awareness and shaping public health behavior in India.



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PERSONAL NARRATIVES AND EMOTIONAL EXPRESSION IN COMICS

Comics as a Platform for Personal Stories. Comics are a compelling platform for expressing personal stories and emotions during pandemics, offering a unique space for individual voices. Examples of Personal Journey Comics. Personal journey comics during the pandemic have ranged from depictions of frontline healthcare workers to stories of individuals coping with lockdown and isolation. For instance, Iranian cartoonist Bozorgmehr Hosseinpour's *The Sacrifice* (2021), poignantly portrays the emotional weight borne by healthcare professionals, capturing both their resilience and vulnerability. 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
